



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# Mission Statement

The Oregon Commentator is an independent journal of opinion published at the University of Oregon for the campus community. Founded by a group of concerned student journalists on September 27, 1983, the Commentator has had a major impact in the "war of ideas" on campus, providing students with an alternative to the left-wing orthodoxy promoted by other student publications, professors and student groups. During its twenty-four year existence, it has enabled University students to hear both sides of issues. Our paper combines reporting with opinion, humor and feature articles. We have won national recognition for our commitment to journalistic excellence.

The Oregon Commentator is operated as a program of the Associated Students of the University of Oregon (ASUO) and is staffed solely by volunteer editors and writers. The paper is funded through student incidental fees, advertising revenue and private donations. We print a wide variety of material, but our main purpose is to show students that a political philosophy of conservatism, free thought and individual liberty is an intelligent way of looking at the world—contrary to what they might hear in classrooms and on campus. In general, editors of the Commentator share beliefs in the following:

- We believe that the University should be a forum for rational and informed debate—instead of the current climate in which ideological dogma, political correctness, fashion and mob mentality interfere with academic pursuit.
- We emphatically oppose totalitarianism and its apologists.
- We believe that it is important for the University community to view the world realistically, intelligently, and above all, rationally.

# I-FEE TAKES A CUT, SENATE CRIES

Thanks to several recently approved changes to the Clark Document, the governing document of the ASUO, University of Oregon students can look forward to a much lower Incidental Fee this spring term, and every spring term to follow.

What does this mean to you, the student? It means that a non-trivial amount of your money is no longer feeding the three-ring circus that is the ASUO.

Every term, the University charges students with what it calls the Incidental Fee. The I-fee goes towards student programs and services, such as DDS, student unions and student publications (such as this magazine). The fee is set every year based on projected student enrollment numbers.

The problem is that the I-fee is raised every year, and the university habitually over-compensates in its projections. (Better to be over-budget than under, no?) This results in a very, very large amount of I-fee money left over by the end of spring term, money that accrues in what is known as the Over-realized Fund.

Over-realized fund money (read: your money) is traditionally spent at the end of spring term by the ASUO Senate in what can only be described as a feeding frenzy. Student programs line up, first-come-first-serve, and put in requests for whatever their little hearts desire – flat-screen TV's, money for "retreats," and on and on and on.

For example, the Senate doled out \$800,000 in over-realized funds at the end of last school year. One approved request, submitted by the Black Women of Achievement, was for a \$65,000 "hair show." The request was later vetoed by the University Administration, but it just goes to show what a group of un-concerned citizens can do when given large amounts of public money (once again, your money) and little oversight.


But no more.

Thanks to a new modeling system, the University can now more accurately project spring term enrollment numbers. ASUO Executive Sam Dotters-Katz made the bold decision that, with the newly available information, the I-fee be lowered as much as possible every spring term to avoid excess money rolling into the over-realized fund.

The changes recently passed the desk of President Frohnmyer and are on their way to being approved by the State Board of Higher Education.

Furthermore, another change to the Clark Document will not allow over-realized monies to be spent during fall and winter term. This would, in essence, take a huge chunk out of the over-realized fund that accrues each year, as well as end the spending frenzy that accompanies it.

Rough estimates place the adjusted spring term I-fee at \$84. According to Dotters-Katz, future O-R funds will be as low as 25k-75k a year. To put it in perspective, there is about \$890,000 in this year's O-R fund already and, if it weren't



for the new changes, it was projected to grow close to \$2.5 million by the end of the year. This is also the first time that the I-Fee has been significantly lowered, well, pretty much ever.

"I wrestled with what to do about this issue all summer," said Dotters-Katz. "For me, the crux of the matter was to define the over-realized Fund for what it is: the unfair over-taxation of the student body."

In terms of fiscal responsibility, this is the most important change in the way the ASUO collects student money in recent memory. One would think that the ASUO Senate would be pleased with these changes, since it saves students' money (their constituents, mind you). Well, they are not happy.

ASUO Sen. Kate Jones was quoted in an Oregon Daily Emerald article as saying: "I'd like to see (the over-realized changes) happen next year. We allocated a lot of money at the beginning of the year, and we did so under the impression that there would be a large sum of money in the over-realized fund at the end of the year."

Senate is crying because they don't have dump trucks full of your money to play with anymore. They can no longer curry favors and votes by funding various pet projects. Here's Sen. Nick Schultz in another ODE article:

"Funding we allocate can be reduced out from under (the Senate). I want to be clear. I don't disagree with the de-







# ASUO Senate considers being ethical, decides against it

**O**n Wednesday, October 29th, Senate decided to not include a "code of conduct" outlining the ethical responsibilities expected of ASUO Senators. This conduct code was based on the ethics bill authored by Former ASUO President Jared Axelrod, Former VP Juliana Guzman (2006-2007), and presented last school year (2007-2008) by Senator Kate Jones and Former Senator Neil Brown.

Both Jones and Brown ran on the original Campaign for Change featuring Executive Candidates Sara Hamilton and Athan Papiliou, which ran on a platform of ethical behavior and, as the name of the slate states, change. After sweeping the elections, Brown and Jones presented the first ethics proposal in memorable history.

According to a statement from Sen. Jones, the ethics bill was sent to Constitution Court by the 2007-2008 Senate, and was never ruled on—the bill was not stopped by not ASUO Senate, but it was not further pursued, either. Any changes to the Senate's governance document have to be put forth by November 1st and the Con. Court failed to rule in a timely enough manner to allow for a change.

This year, Senators Derek Nix and Emma Kallaway brought fourth a code of conduct with hopes that it would help the Senate avoid bias and force them to make decisions based on facts, rather than personal interest.

There was an air of inevitability when Senate voted the proposed ethics addition down. It was hardly surprising. The Senator most vocal in his opposition to the change

was Sen. Nick Gower, which is also not at all surprising; He seems to have a predilection for voting "no" this year. What was more surprising was Sen. Tyler Scandalios' motion to vote down the proposed change.

Tyler Scandalios ran on this year's Oregon Action Team, whose platform was based largely on eliminating the bias and special interests that dominated student government in years past. He also ran on Sara and Athan's Campaign for Change. "Change?" "Action?" It seems that Sen. Scandalios is not much interested in either of them. He proved as much by moving to vote down the only proposal aimed at holding Senators accountable for their actions. In Sen. Scandalios' defense, he states that he voted the bill down because, "The conduct code, as it read, would have caused petty bickering within the Senate, encouraged vague and subjective grievances, and would have been unenforceable." While it is true that phrases like "viewpoint neutral" are not objectively quantifiable, it is disappointing that some sort of compromise was not proposed.

Sen. Kallaway, in an interview, explained that *it was midterms week and the Senate was tired (!!)* and that may have been why they choose to vote the proposal down, instead of working on a compromise. "I understand the fear of have rules [sic] that stifle our free speech but it is important to work within parameters we can all work with." How eloquently stated.

Sen. Nix stated: "I wanted to

## Proposed code of conduct

13.1 The following prohibitions apply to the Student Senate:

(a). Each Student Senator shall conduct themselves at all times in a manner that shall reflect credibility on the Student Senate.

(b). A Student Senator may not receive compensation and may not permit compensation to accrue in their beneficial interest from any source, the receipt of which would occur by virtue of influence improperly exerted from their position in the Student Senate.

(c). A Student Senator may not knowingly use their position to solicit gifts or otherwise gain advantages improperly exerted from their position in the Student Senate.

(d). A Student Senator may not authorize or otherwise allow any individual, program or organization not under direction and control of the Student Senate to speak on behalf of the Student Senate without the knowledge and authorization of the Student Senate.

(e). No Student Senator shall represent another ASUO Program, outside company, or other entity in order to gain unfair advantage improperly exerted from their position in the Student Senate.

(f). All voting shall be made in a viewpoint neutral manner. No member of the Student Senate shall vote in a way that would promote a real or seemingly incompatibility between one's public and fiduciary duties.

13.2 A Student Senator may file a complaint against another Student Senator for violations of this Rule. The process for this complaint shall be in accordance with Student Senate Rule 6.

# The measure of a manly president



*OC contributor Michelle Haley recently filed a grievance against ASUO Senator Nathan Perley for nonfulfillment of duties. We thought it was pretty sweet, so we're reprinting it here.*

[Ed Note: Below is an addendum to a grievance filed by OC contributor Michelle Haley against ASUO Senator Nathan Perley. Haley charged Perley with 11 counts of non-fulfillment of duties. Not doing one's job is pretty par for the course for the ASUO, but Perley was also proposing a \$50 increase next year for the stipend that his position, Senate treasurer, receives.

*On the table to the right, you can see other naughty Senators. Anyone with more than three red marks is technically in nonfulfillment of duties. Say, it would be kind of funny if half the Senate got fired, wouldn't it?]*

Members of the Constitution Court,

Petitioner submits an addendum to the grievance filed against Senator Nathan Perley for not fulfilling his duties as an ASUO Academic Senator and as the elected Student Senate Treasurer. However, Petitioner would first like the Court to note that the grievance against the Respondent is both serious in nature, and of significant merit. Unlike previous grievances submitted before this Court, such as the infamous "Seven Cents Petition" or the campaign grievance against a former Senate President for sending an email a few minutes late, the Petitioner's grievance is in response to Senator Perley neglecting multiple duties over a period exceeding three weeks.

Unfortunately, previous grievances before the Constitution Court appeared as nothing but political weaponry aimed to deface Student Government and hard working

elected officials. Petitioner hopes the Court views this grievance in a different light—one of accountability and respect to the office by which members of the Student Senate have been elected, and to proceed hearing this case with the most serious considerations. Petitioner maintains all original complaints against Senator Perley. However, the following are amendments to the original grievance as well as clarifications to the response submitted by the Respondent. (However, Petitioner would like to note that Respondent failed to serve Petitioner with the response).

Petitioner amends original grievance against Senator Perley to include citation of item 14.3 of the ASUO Constitution.

Per the ASUO Constitution 14.3:

"Non fulfillment of duties for three weeks will be considered a vacancy of any office elected or appointed under this Constitution."

Clearly, Senator Perley has not

fulfilled several of his duties for a period longer than three weeks, and by the prescribed legislature of the ASUO Constitution, should be removed from office.


## 1. Insufficient office hours

Respondent failed to maintain sufficient office hours during Weeks 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5 according to the office hour log database maintained by the Senate Ombudsperson. See Appendix A for this record.

## 2. Failure to post office hours

Petitioner amends original grievance against Senator Perley failing to post his office hours to reference Section 5.2(d) of the Student Senate Rules. Respondent admits to failing to fulfill this duty in Respondent's most recent response.

## 3. Failure to update the Student Senate with information regarding

## Senate Surplus and other financial information

Audiotape records maintained by the Senate Vice President indicate that Senator Perley did not update the Student Senate with financial information on October 8, 15, and 29, 2008. Petitioner requests that the Court make these records available to the public. Per Oregon Public Meeting Law ORS 192.005, audio record is considered a form of public record archive and per ORS 192.001 should be available to concerned cit-

izens—or in the case of a University Community, concerned students.

Per the ASUO Constitution 6.13:

"All meetings of the Student Senate shall be in accordance with the Oregon Public Meetings Law."

Had they been accessible they would have been posted as an appendix to this addendum.

While I understand that these recordings are the responsibility of the Senate Vice President, and not the Senate Treasurer, I plead that you understand the gravity of these re-

cordings not being made available. This behavior of violating Oregon Public Meeting Laws and the ASUO Constitution has become a pattern in this branch of student government. Last year, for example, the Senate's Over-realized Committee blatantly violated Oregon Public Meeting Laws resulting in Opinion 29 C. C. (2007/2008). If this court wishes to see the ASUO Student Senate adhere to the prescribed laws, you must consider this grievance in a stringent manor.

# A message from Obamatopia: 2016







be clear that I appreciate the input that Senate gave me through this process in regards to the Rules Changes as a whole. The wording of the proposed Code of Conduct should have been more clear which is why, I think, the Code of Conduct did not make it past Senate." He added that "[t]he negative outcome of not including a Code of Conduct in Senate Rules will be that there is going to be no way to hold Senators accountable for their actions. It will also make it difficult to have discussions on conduct when there are no set rules regarding the issue." Some of the most controversial issues from the past, such as Jerome Roberts collecting a stipend when he was no longer a UO student, last year's Executive allegedly hosting a campaign event titled "Take Back Campus" using ASUO resources, and former Sen. Gulley's infamous trip to Hawaii could have been punished more harshly had such a code of conduct been in effect.

When asked about the situation, Athan Papiliou, last year's Senate President remarked, "Recognizing that rules and laws do not always dictate the most ethical behavior, we rely on rules to institutionalize ideas and processes for future leaders. For the first time in several years, our Association is privileged to have a reform-minded Senate coupled with an Executive of high character and moral fiber. Unfortunately, however, ASUO election history tells us that we cannot rely on this past year as a trend for the future."

Without some sort of ethics polivy in the ASUO Governance Document, we will continue to see scandalous behavior in our stu-



dent government, and misuse of student funds.

It is very possible the problem goes beyond just this ethics bill. The Ethics Committee, which is a standing Senate Committee, waited until week six to have their first meeting and to elect a chair. That is to say that it took over *half of Fall Term* to get Senators to attend their first committee meeting. I wish I could say I find this surprising, but such behavior is representative of the attitude of the Senate thus far this school year.

President Sam Dotters-Katz, when questioned about the Senate's overall ethical behavior, had this to say:

"It was unfortunate the senate struck down the code of ethics. I think so far we have seen a huge divide between the majority of senators who are truly dedicated to the job and the few others who continually show up late, disrespect and demean group and program leaders who come before them, and fail to show any sort of commitment to serving anything besides their own egos."

I personally hope to see a change toward ethical behavior in the coming months. We'll see.

cision, I disagree with the rules."




